Hi Elisabeth, Ann, and Yurij,

In this section, CM O'Brien's aide Jesse Perrin identifies a list of 11 "stakeholders" in the encampments legislation. They are all supporters of the ACLU's position on the legislation. No neighborhood groups are included among the stakeholders.

I also believe the conversation was extremely productive and strong pieces of the legislation were identified where other parts showed potential for amendments. There definitely is a need for us to convene and move forward on legislative language.

Receiving direction from Mike, I have spoken to Councilmember Herbold, Johnson, and Bagshaw's offices as well as Mercedes Elizalde from Councilmember Juarez's Office about the opportunity for our offices to meet with stakeholders to identify shared language that we can move forward on. In addition to you three, those stakeholders include Lisa Daugaard and Patricia Sully from the Public Defender Association, Alison Eisinger from the Seattle King County Coalition on Homelessness, Tim Harris from Real Change, Leslie Smith from the Alliance for Pioneer Square, Don Blakeney from the Downtown Seattle Association, David Watkins from the Inn at the Market, and Ben Franz-Knight from Pike Place Market.

You also noted the complexity of amending the legislation with such a short window. That is definitely a challenge and a few of the Council offices, including us and Councilmember Herbold's office, are meeting with Central Staff to discuss a timeline for this legislation. I can definitely provide information from that meeting with y'all.

With support from LaKecia in our office, we will be sending out an invite for the meeting with that stakeholders and Council offices list soon.

Thank you again for all the work that's been put in and that will continue for this important issue. And please let me know if I can answer any questions.

Dear Mike and Lisa

Ann LoGerfo of Columbia Legal Services (a close ally of the ACLU and CM O'Brien) directs CMs O'Brien and Herbold to submit an editorial for the Seattle *Times* to "keep the messaging going." She then offers to draft it. The final version of the letter was likely drafted by the ACLU's Smith.

We have been talking about the possibility of an op-ed piece. Yesterday, Yurij and I reviewed hundreds of emails to better inform the messaging. However, as it turns out, an earlier draft written by Yurij and Elisabeth has been accepted by the Seattle Times, and will be published on Friday.

This gives us an opportunity to keep the messaging going, in the same way those opposing the ordinance have been able to do. We propose an op-ed from both of you – CMs Herbold and O'Brien – which responds to the community, and addresses these comments head on. We think this would be the most productive way to go, and would have the biggest impact. The version being published this Friday would not have the same tone or content, and the version from you two would be powerful not just because of who you are, but also because it would be informed by events of the past week as well.

What are your thoughts? We would be happy to prepare a first draft for your review.
